OUR MISSION

Since its founding in December 2020, **CONCORDIA Projekte Sociale Kosovo** has become a recognised local actor in child protection, education and family support in southern Kosovo. Its work is centred in Prizren and Gjakova, where it has formal cooperation agreements with both municipalities for the social integration of Roma, Ashkali, Egyptian and other vulnerable children and families. CONCORDIA is also certified by Keeping Children Safe as a Child-Safe organisation.

CONCORDIA Kosovo is part of the wider **CONCORDIA Social Projects** network, active in Romania, Bulgaria, Moldova, Austria, Germany and Switzerland, and is fully aligned with its mission, values and programme standards. Its main aim is to support children and youth from marginalised backgrounds on their path towards an independent life.

Arti is an eight-year-old boy from Gjakova, currently in the first grade. After school, he spends his afternoons at the CONCORDIA Ali Ibra day center, a place that gives him a bit of stability in an otherwise difficult life. His family struggles with serious economic and social challenges, and basic needs are not always easy to meet. One day, when someone gave Arti one euro, he didn't think about buying something for himself. Instead, he quietly said he would send it to his mother so she could buy bread.

Even at such a young age, Arti carries a strong sense of responsibility and care for his family. When he talks about the future, he says he wants to become a teacher—so he can help other children and make sure they don't go through the same hardships he faces today.

Arti's story is simple, but deeply human—a reminder of strength, love, and hope in the face of struggle.

CONCORDIA makes an impact.

The European countries in which CONCORDIA operates are currently facing numerous challenges. The social consequences of geopolitical crises, growing inequality, and structural shortcomings are particularly evident in the lives of children and young people. Intergenerational poverty is not a marginal phenomenon—it is a reality for millions of young people across Europe. But it is preventable. Through its programs, CONCORDIA addresses this reality with a clear stance: children's rights must be placed at the center. They are essential for social stability, economic development, and, above all, the sustainable advancement of society's future viability. If we fail to invest in children today, we risk undermining Europe's social cohesion tomorrow. Creating meaningful impact here is our mission.

The year 2025 marks a significant step forward for us. With this report, we present our impact for the first time using five key indicators: well-being, educational success, self-determination, child protection, and reach. In doing so, we make visible what often remains unseen—whether interventions truly help break the cycle of intergenerational poverty.

In 2025, we were able to support a total of 21,371 children, young people, and families from Romania, Moldova, Bulgaria and Kosovo. At the same time, our data show that more than 98% of the children and young people we supported successfully continue their educational paths.

These figures are encouraging—and they demonstrate that targeted, long-term support works. For us, this transparency is both a commitment and a responsibility. Measuring impact also means taking responsibility: for what works—and for what we must improve. We are learning, and we are committed to continuous development together. At the same time, it remains clear: numbers alone do not change lives. Behind every figure are children with their own unique stories. The voices and experiences of the children and young people we support are the benchmark for our actions. With our second Policy Report (CONCORDIA Day Centre Model), we have also systematically analyzed our day center model based on evidence and, for the first time, linked it to a petition at the European level. In doing so, we deliberately go beyond operational work and bring our experience into political decision-making processes. Sustainable change requires structural responses—and we pursue these together with our partners and networks.

Our work shows that solutions exist. But they require political and societal will, long-term commitment, and the determination to consistently place ALL children and young people at the center.

We would like to thank all partners, donors, and companions who walk this path with us. Together, we share responsibility for a future in which every child has the opportunity to lead a self-determined life.

With confidence and determination, we continue our work.

Dear children, colleagues and partners,

The year 2025 has been a year of important progress, meaningful partnerships, and continued commitment to the children, young people, and families we serve. As CONCORDIA Kosovo marks five years of presence and impact in the country, we look back with pride on the achievements made possible through the dedication of our team, the trust of the communities we work with, and the support of our partners and donors.

Throughout the year, we continued to strengthen our services in Prizren and Gjakova, ensuring that children and families had access to education, psychosocial support, health services, and opportunities for personal development. An important milestone was the official licensing of the Tranzit Centre as a private kindergarten, reinforcing our commitment to providing quality early childhood education and expanding opportunities for the youngest members of our communities. This is in addition to the LC license and the social services licenses, which were successfully renewed until 2028. These recognitions attest to the quality of the educational, social, and family support services we deliver and further strengthen the Community-Based Tranzit Centre's position as a community hub serving diverse target groups.

Our cooperation with local institutions continued to deliver tangible results. In Gjakova, the partnership with the Municipality enabled the introduction of free daily school transportation for children attending the Ali Ibra Centre as well as all the other students from the same neighborhood, helping to remove barriers to education. Additionally, Municipality of Prizren continued to cover part of the food and school supplies expenditures for the children supported by the CONCORDIA Tranzit centre. This year also marked a significant step forward in youth participation. The establishment of the first CONCORDIA Kosovo Youth Council created new opportunities for young people to contribute to decision-making processes and represent the interests of their peers. At the same time, initiatives such as Digi Youth (Project funded by Land Voralberg, Austria) equipped young people with valuable digital skills and increased their awareness of educational and professional opportunities in an increasingly digital world.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to our donors, especially our strategic partner Renovabis, as well as to long term partners like Jesuitenwelweit, Vita Activa and Marie Eberth Foundation, partners, municipalities, schools, and community stakeholders for their continued trust and support. My special appreciation goes to the staff and volunteers of CONCORDIA Kosovo, whose professionalism, dedication, and compassion make a difference in the lives of children and families every day.

As we move forward, we remain committed to strengthening our services, promoting inclusion, and creating opportunities for every child and young person to reach their full potential. While challenges remain, we are confident that through partnership, solidarity, and perseverance, we can continue building a brighter future for the communities we serve. The Programme Outreach enables CONCORDIA Kosovo to reach vulnerable children and families beyond its centres, bringing educational, social, and awareness-raising activities directly into communities. Through mobile outreach and community engagement, the programme promotes inclusion and connects programme participants with the support and services they need.

In 2025, female programme participants accounted for 55.0% of all participations in CONCORDIA Kosovo programmes, while 45.0% were male participants. This strong engagement of girls and women reflects CONCORDIA's commitment to creating inclusive opportunities for education, personal development, well-being, and community participation. By supporting girls, young women, and mothers through a wide range of services and activities, CONCORDIA continues to contribute to greater empowerment, social inclusion, and equal opportunities for all.

Children (aged 3–18) remained the primary focus of CONCORDIA Kosovo's programmes in 2025, representing 97.8% of all recorded participations. At the same time, this year marked an important step forward in expanding our work with young people. Through initiatives such as the Youth Council, digital competencies training, vocational guidance, and life skills activities, we increased youth participation in our centres. This reflects CONCORDIA's growing commitment to supporting young people during their transition to adulthood and creating new opportunities for their active participation, personal development, and future employment.

CONCORDIA AT THE INTERNATIONAL LEVEL

CONCORDIA Social Projects is an international network of organizations operating in several European countries: Austria, Germany, Moldova, Bulgaria, Romania, Switzerland and since 2021 also in Kosovo. The organization works to protect children's rights and to support children, young people and families in difficult social situations. In all the countries where it operates, CONCORDIA's mission is to be where the need is greatest and to provide sustainable support through day centres, shelters, alternative education, emergency intervention programmes and psychosocial support.

In 2025, CONCORDIA's international network continued to expand its impact, sharing knowledge, resources and best practices among field teams, strengthening capacities and the quality of services in all member countries.



CONCORDIA IN KOSOVO

CONCORDIA Projekte Sociale is part of the international network CONCORDIA Social Projects and began its activities in 2021. As a non-governmental organization, it develops two main programmes through two multifunctional day centres in Prizren and Gjakova:

- 1 **CONCORDIA “TRANZIT” CENTRE**
- 2 **CONCORDIA “ALI IBRA” CENTRE**



MAKING OUR IMPACT MEASURABLE

At CONCORDIA Kosovo, creating meaningful change in the lives of children, young people, and families is at the heart of everything we do. To better understand, measure, and strengthen this impact, we have aligned our work with a results-based framework built around five Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). These indicators help us assess progress, improve programme quality, and ensure that our interventions respond to the real needs of the communities we serve.

The KPI framework allows us to move beyond counting activities and programme participants by focusing on the changes that children, youth, and families experience as a result of our support. Through regular monitoring, data collection, and evaluation, we can better understand what works, identify areas for improvement, and make informed decisions for future programming.



1

KPI 1 **Strengthening** **Well-being**

Children and families should feel safe, healthy, and supported in their daily lives. This indicator measures improvements in emotional well-being, physical health, social relationships, and overall stability. By strengthening protective factors and providing access to support services, CONCORDIA helps children build resilience and develop in a positive environment.

2

KPI 2 **Securing** **Educational** **Success**

Education is one of the most powerful tools for breaking the cycle of poverty and exclusion. This indicator focuses on children's access to education, school attendance, learning outcomes, and educational progression. Through educational support and cooperation with schools and families, CONCORDIA contributes to creating better opportunities for long-term success.

KPI 3 **Enabling Self-** **Determination**

Young people should have the knowledge, confidence, and skills needed to make informed decisions about their future. This indicator measures the extent to which participants develop independence, life skills, leadership capacities, and active participation in society.

4

KPI 4 **Ensuring Child** **Safeguarding**

Every child has the right to grow up in a safe and protective environment. This indicator measures how effectively child protection concerns are identified, addressed, and prevented. Through safeguarding systems, awareness-raising, and professional case management, CONCORDIA works to ensure that children are protected from harm and supported whenever risks arise.

KPI 5 **Expanding** **Outreach and** **Access**

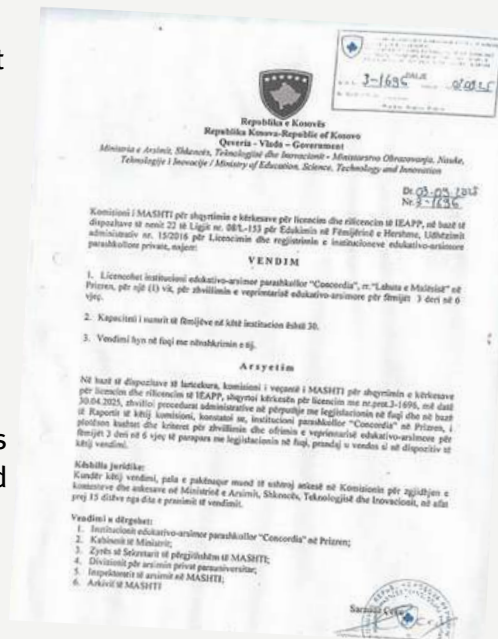
Meaningful impact begins with reaching those who need support the most. This indicator focuses on the accessibility and reach of our programmes, particularly among vulnerable and marginalized communities.

HIGHLIGHTS

OPEN DOORS DAY AND LICENSING OF TRANZIT AS A PRIVATE KINDERGARTEN

On 30 May 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo organised an Open Doors event to inform the local community about our intention to formalise the services provided to children aged 3–6 by applying to the Ministry of Education for a licence to operate as an Early Childhood Education unit. The license has been obtained in September.

Immediately after, we registered our unit for the Voucher scheme program of the Ministry of Education, to support registration of children from families programme participants of the social schemes to early childhood education. The licence was obtained in September. Immediately afterwards, we registered our Early Childhood Education unit under the Ministry of Education's Voucher Scheme, enabling children from families benefiting from social assistance schemes to access early childhood education services with financial support.



HIGHLIGHTS

ENSURING ACCESS TO EDUCATION THROUGH SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION

Access to education remains one of the key challenges for children living in marginalized and remote communities. For many families, the lack of reliable transportation can become a significant barrier to regular school attendance. At the Ali Ibra Centre in Gjakova, CONCORDIA Kosovo identified this challenge early and took the initiative to organize daily transportation for children to and from school. Through this support, children were able to attend classes regularly, reducing absenteeism and strengthening their engagement in education.



The positive results achieved through this intervention demonstrated the importance of transportation as a tool for educational inclusion. Building on these achievements, CONCORDIA Kosovo successfully ensure the daily transportation, in two shifts being supported by the Municipality of Gjakova. Since 2nd of May 2025, children attending the Ali Ibra Centre have benefited from free daily school transportation provided with the support of the municipality. This achievement represents an important step toward ensuring sustainable access to education for vulnerable children and families.

In Prizren, CONCORDIA Kosovo continued its long-standing cooperation with the Municipality of Prizren through an addendum to the Partnership Agreement signed in April 2025. As a result, the municipality continued to contract a bus service that provides daily transportation for children from the villages of Landovica and Pirana to and from the Transit Centre.

These partnerships demonstrate how collaboration between civil society and local institutions can remove barriers to education and create equal opportunities for every child to learn, develop, and reach their full potential.

TANI PROJECT

TRANSFORMING LIVES THROUGH EDUCATION, PROTECTION AND INCLUSION

In 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo continued the implementation of the TANI Project, a three years project funded by our strategic partner Renovabis. Through its community centres in Prizren and Gjakova, providing integrated support to children, youth, and families in vulnerable situations. The project combined educational support, psychosocial services, family empowerment, youth development, and child safeguarding within a holistic, child-centred approach.

Interventions were delivered through a multidisciplinary team consisting of educators, social workers, psychologists, youth workers, and health professionals. Based on individual assessments and case management plans, children received educational support, counselling, creative and recreational activities, while families benefited from home visits, Parent

School sessions, women's support groups, and social assistance. A particular focus was placed on strengthening children's well-being, preventing school dropout, promoting youth participation, and supporting families to create safer and more nurturing environments for their children. The project also contributed to the establishment of youth participation mechanisms and the promotion of children's rights within the communities.

At the institutional level, CONCORDIA Kosovo continued to strengthen cooperation with municipalities, schools, and national institutions while improving internal procedures, safeguarding standards, and staff capacities.



RESEARCH

ASSESSMENT OF DEVELOPMENT AND BEHAVIOUR IN CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS (AGES 6–17)

In 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo completed a comprehensive longitudinal research study aimed at assessing the developmental skills and behavioural functioning of children and adolescents participating in its programmes in Prizren and Gjakova. This study was conducted with the support of TANI Project. The study was conducted by Mr. Arber Zeka, Consultant, Clinical Psychologist, Psychotherapist and PhD Candidate, and Ms. Valbona Belallari, Clinical Psychologist and Psychotherapist at CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre, bringing together scientific expertise and practical experience in child development and psychosocial support. The research was designed to evaluate the effectiveness of CONCORDIA Kosovo's holistic intervention model and to better understand the developmental progress of children receiving educational, psychological, social, and family support services. By following participants over a two-year period, the study provided valuable insights into how long-term engagement in community-based programmes contributes to children's well-being and overall development.

The December 2025 re-evaluation of 167 children participating in CONCORDIA Kosovo programmes showed that the majority continued to demonstrate positive developmental outcomes across all assessed domains. Most children did not experience significant difficulties in motor, cognitive, social, or emotional functioning. However, the findings also highlighted that around one in four children (24.1%) continue to face persistent challenges in academic skills, while smaller proportions require additional support with attention, behaviour, memory, and emotional well-being. These results reinforce the importance of targeted, individualised interventions to ensure every child has the opportunity to reach their full potential.



Using internationally recognized assessment tools, the research examined multiple areas of child development, including communication skills, learning abilities, social interaction, emotional regulation, behavioural functioning, attention, memory, and adaptive skills. The study involved children and adolescents aged 6 to 17 years from both the Tranzit Centre in Prizren and the Ali Ibra Centre in Gjakova, while also incorporating information from schools and families to ensure a comprehensive assessment process.

The findings confirmed the importance of sustained and integrated support for vulnerable children. Positive outcomes were observed in several developmental domains, particularly in communication, social interaction, emotional development, and adaptive functioning.

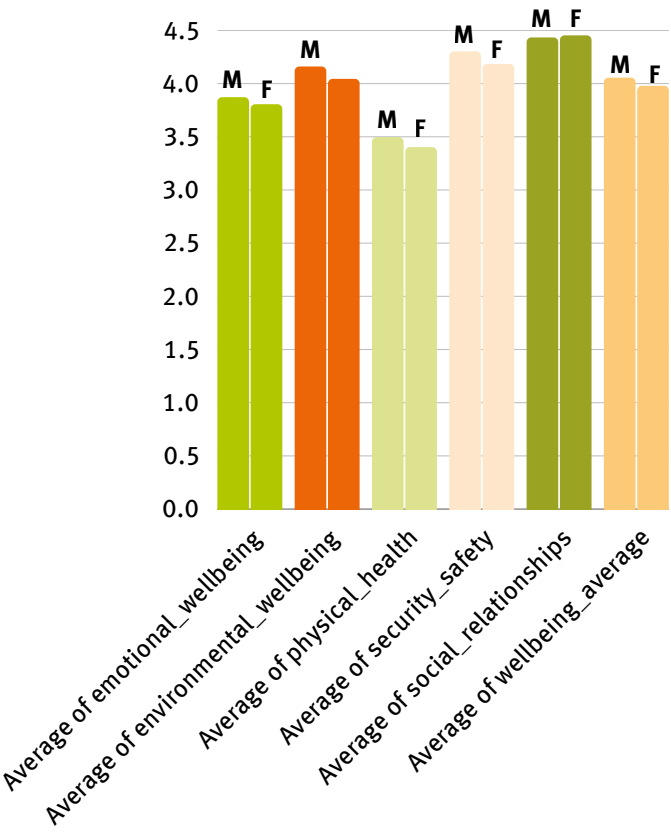

WELL-BEING BEYOND NUMBERS

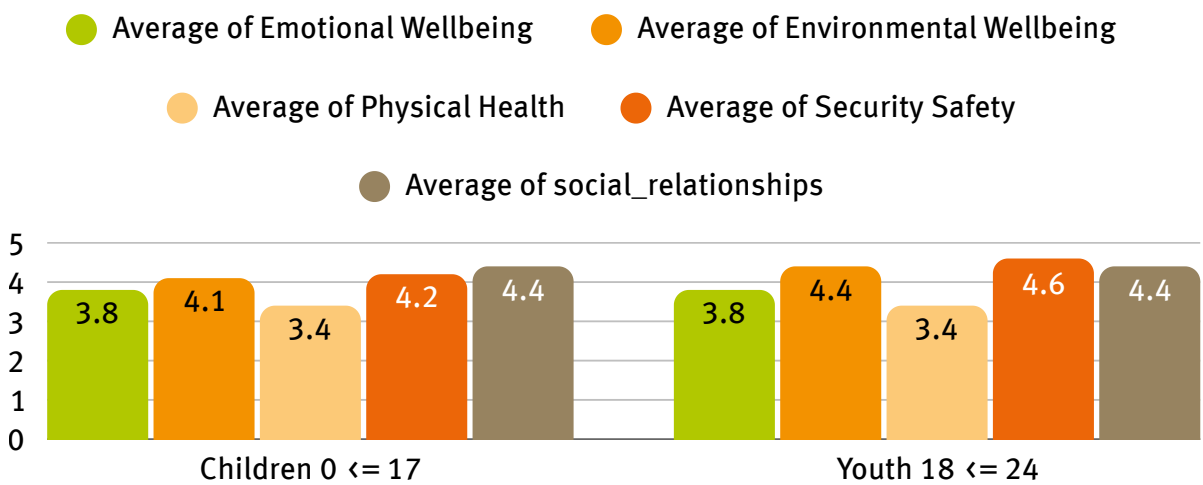
The well-being assessment conducted in 2025 showed very similar results between girls and boys across all measured domains, indicating that both groups benefit equally from CONCORDIA Kosovo's programmes. One particularly interesting finding was that girls reported slightly stronger social relationships (4.45) compared to boys (4.43), while boys scored marginally higher in emotional well-being, physical health, environmental well-being, and feelings of safety. Overall, both groups demonstrated high levels of well-being, reflecting the positive and inclusive environment created through CONCORDIA's educational, psychosocial, and community-based interventions.

The 2025 well-being assessment revealed positive outcomes for both children and youth participating in CONCORDIA Kosovo programmes. While children reported the strongest results in social relationships (4.45), young people aged 18–24 showed even higher levels of environmental well-being (4.35) and feelings of security and safety (4.58). These findings suggest that participants feel supported not only by their peers and families but also by the environments in which they learn, grow, and participate.

EDUCATION AND INTEGRATION

CREATING EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR ROMA, ASHKALI AND EGYPTIAN CHILDREN

In line with the priorities of the Ministry of Education, Science, Technology and Innovation (MESTI) to promote inclusive, equitable, and quality education for all children, the project “Education and Integration – Transit Center Initiative for Roma, Ashkali and Egyptian Children” aims to improve educational opportunities for children from marginalized communities in Prizren.

The project provides comprehensive support to 80 children through daily homework assistance, learning support sessions, psychosocial counseling, and extracurricular activities. By creating a supportive learning environment, the project helps children strengthen their academic skills, increase school attendance, and reduce the risk of dropping out of school. Recognizing that educational success is closely linked to a child’s overall well-being, the project also provides daily meals, school materials, clothing, and other essential support. These interventions help remove barriers that often prevent children from fully participating in education.

An important aspect of the initiative is the active involvement of parents and families. Through regular meetings, awareness sessions, and counseling activities, families are encouraged to play a stronger role in supporting their children’s education and personal development. This collaborative approach strengthens the relationship between families, schools, and the wider community.

By investing in children's education and well-being, the project helps create better opportunities for their future development and social inclusion.



A FULL CIRCLE OF IMPACT

Labi's story begins in Tranzit. A modest home. Shared spaces. Parents, siblings, everyday struggles, and quiet dreams that didn't yet know how to ask for more.

From the very start, CONCORDIA became part of his life. Not as an institution, not as a project, but as something deeply human. A place that felt like family before he even understood what belonging truly meant. It was at CONCORDIA where Labi touched a piano for the first time. Where sound became meaning. Where music teacher saw him and said, "You have talent, and it matters." Those words stayed with him. They changed his direction.

With the support of teachers and mentors who believed in him when belief was rare, Labi completed his music high school education. CONCORDIA supported him every step of the way—encouraging him, standing by him, opening doors he never imagined could open for someone like him. But CONCORDIA shaped more than his education. It shaped his life. It was there that Labi met Leodita—the love of his life. Two young people from a tranzit center, dreaming together, choosing to build something stronger than their beginnings.



Today, they share a family and are parents to two sons. A future rooted in resilience. When university felt distant, CONCORDIA made it possible. Through continuous support—academic, financial, and emotional, Labi completed his faculty studies. And the journey didn't stop there. Today, he is pursuing his Master's degree, carrying forward everything he was once given.

Now, Labi stands where it all began, as a piano teacher at CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre. In the same place where he once learned to believe in himself, he now teaches others to believe in themselves too. Every note he plays carries memory. Every lesson carries hope. He is also a volunteer. Because he remembers what it felt like to be given a chance. Because he wants children to receive what once changed his life: trust, encouragement, and a vision of a future.

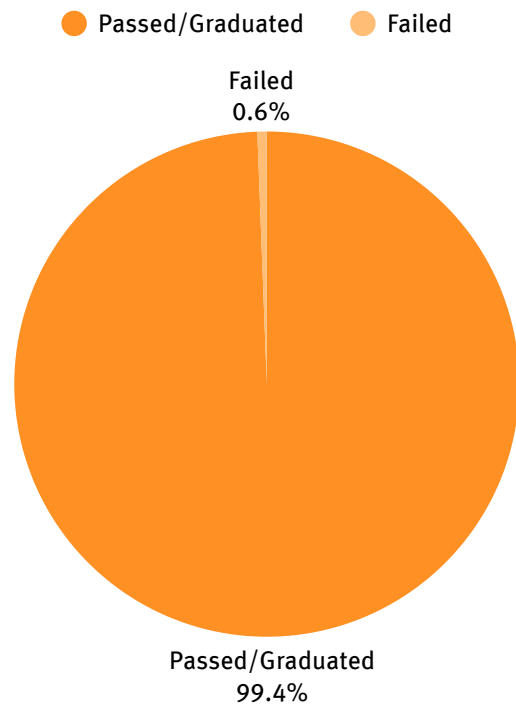


KPI 2 - SECURING EDUCATIONAL SUCCESS

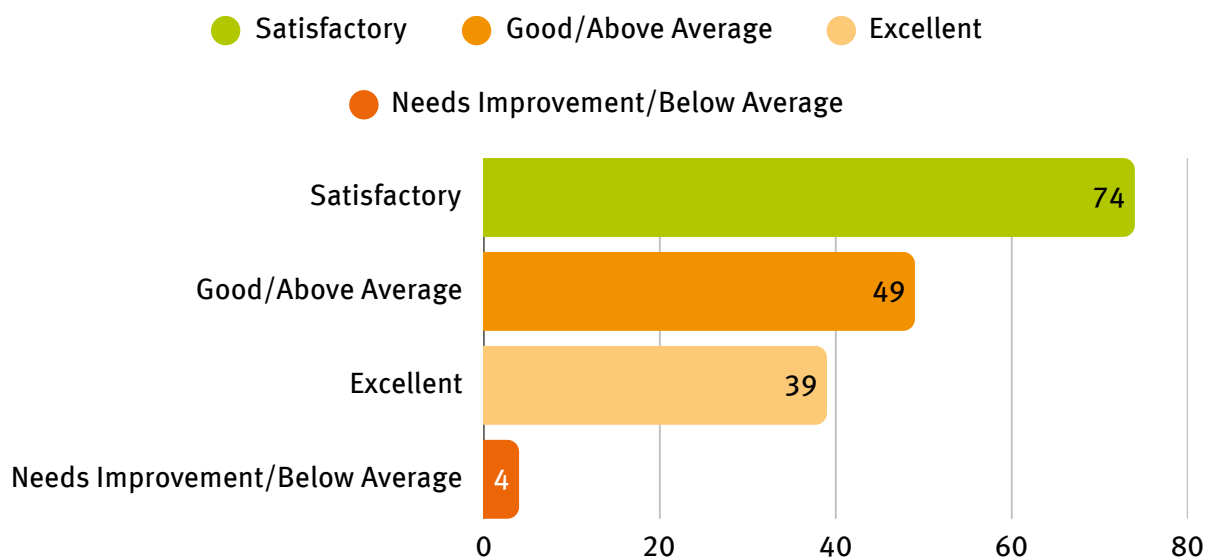
During the 2025 academic year, 166 out of 167 children participating in CONCORDIA Kosovo's educational programmes successfully passed or graduated, resulting in an impressive 99.4% school completion rate. At the Ali Ibra Centre, 76 children completed the school year, while 90 children achieved the same milestone through the CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre.

The final academic results of children participating in CONCORDIA Kosovo's educational programmes demonstrate strong overall performance. Among the 166 children who successfully completed the school year, 74 (44.6%) achieved Satisfactory grades, 49 (29.5%) achieved Good or Above Average results, and 39 (23.5%) attained Excellent grades. Only 4 children (2.4%) were identified as Needs Improvement/Below Average, highlighting that the vast majority of programme participants met or exceeded the expected learning outcomes. These results reflect the positive impact of CONCORDIA's educational support, individual guidance, and close collaboration with families and schools in helping children progress academically and reach their full potential.

MOBILE TEAM

During 2025, CONCORDIA's Mobile Team continued to provide outreach support to vulnerable children and families, focusing on education, social inclusion, child protection, and access to essential services. Through regular home visits, parental counseling, referrals, and material assistance, the Mobile Team worked closely with communities to improve the well-being of children and strengthen family support systems.

MOBILE TEAM – TRANZIT CENTRE

The Mobile Team of Tranzit Centre supported 19 families, reaching 93 individuals, including 61 children. Throughout the year, the team conducted 394 home visits and organized 169 counseling sessions with parents, helping families address educational, social, and legal challenges.

The team also assisted 63 children and their parents in applying for Ministry of Education textbook subsidies and supported 20 high school students with e-Kosova applications. In addition, 338 food and hygiene packages were distributed, while 145 children received clothing and shoes. The Mobile Team further organized four "Next to CONCORDIA Van" outreach activities promoting inclusion and education in different communities.



MOBILE TEAM – ALI IBRA CENTRE

During 2025, the Ali Ibra Centre took its first important steps towards establishing the Mobile Team Programme, expanding CONCORDIA Kosovo's outreach to children and families living in vulnerable communities. Although still in its initial phase, the programme reached 571 programme participants through low-threshold outreach visits, including 238 children. These early interventions focused on building trust within the community, identifying children and families in need, and connecting them with appropriate educational and social support services.



FROM ASHES TO HOPE



Sometimes, a single moment can change the course of a family's life. For Leo and Teo, two brothers full of dreams and energy, that moment came when a devastating fire destroyed their family home, leaving them with nothing but the clothes they were wearing.

In the aftermath of the fire, the family faced enormous uncertainty. Without a home and without basic necessities, Leo and Teo, together with their mother, were forced to seek temporary shelter with relatives in another town, while their father remained in Prizren, relying on the support of friends and extended family. What followed were difficult days marked by instability, emotional distress, and concerns about the future.

As participants in CONCORDIA Kosovo's Day Centre programme in Tranzit, Leo and Teo were already part of a supportive community. As soon as the organization learned about the family's situation, immediate assistance was mobilized. Emergency food, clothing, hygiene products, and other essential items were provided to help the family meet their most urgent needs during the crisis.

Beyond material support, CONCORDIA Kosovo worked closely with local institutions and community stakeholders to identify a sustainable solution. Through coordinated efforts, the family was able to move into a new home in the Tranzit neighbourhood, offering them a safe place to begin rebuilding their lives. The house was furnished with essential household items, including beds, storage units, and kitchen equipment, allowing the family to gradually regain stability and a sense of normality.

Throughout this challenging period, Leo and Teo demonstrated remarkable resilience. Despite the difficulties they had experienced, they remained engaged in activities at the Day Centre, continued to dream about their future, and looked forward to returning to school and rebuilding their daily routines. Their determination served as a powerful reminder that, with the right support, children can overcome even the most difficult circumstances.

YOUTH COUNCIL

YOUTH COUNCIL ELECTIONS: GIVING YOUNG PEOPLE A VOICE

On 30 October 2025, around 40 young people from CONCORDIA Kosovo participated in the first Youth Council Elections, demonstrating their commitment to active participation and leadership. Following a democratic voting process, four youth representatives were elected to form the first CONCORDIA Kosovo Youth Council.

In the weeks leading up to the elections, candidates prepared and presented their ideas, priorities, and visions for representing their peers. Through campaign activities, discussions, and presentations, young people had the opportunity to express their views, advocate for issues important to them, and engage in a transparent electoral process. Election day was marked by enthusiasm, responsibility, and a strong commitment to ensuring that every voice was heard.

The Youth council has 4 members, representatives of the youth from Prizren and Gjakova. Two of the elected members are also representing CONCORDIA Kosovo as members in the International Youth Council, ensuring that the voices of young people from Kosovo are heard within the wider CONCORDIA network.

MEET OUR INTERNATIONAL YOUTH COUNCIL REPRESENTATIVES:



DIGI YOUTH

In 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo successfully implemented the Digi Youth Project, a project financed by the Land Vorarlberg, Austria, empowering young people from disadvantaged communities with essential digital skills and knowledge needed to navigate an increasingly digital world.

The project targeted young people aged 12–16 from vulnerable backgrounds, particularly from Roma, Ashkali, and Egyptian communities, who often face barriers to education, technology, and employment opportunities. Through a series of interactive workshops, practical digital training sessions, technology hub visits, and meetings with ICT professionals, participants gained valuable insights into digital tools, online opportunities, and future career pathways.



The project also engaged mothers from the participating communities, raising their awareness of digitalization and the opportunities that technology can offer for education, communication, and personal development. In parallel, CONCORDIA employees strengthened their capacities through specialized training, enabling them to continue digital literacy activities within the day centres beyond the project's duration. By connecting vulnerable youth with technology, innovation, and positive role models, project contributed to increasing digital inclusion, strengthening life skills, and expanding future opportunities for young people. The successful implementation of the project demonstrated that access to digital knowledge can play an important role in reducing social exclusion and supporting the active participation of youth in modern society.

PARENT'S SCHOOL

The Parents' School programme continued to support mothers and fathers in strengthening their parenting skills and creating positive family environments for their children. Through regular sessions held in both centres, parents discussed topics such as child development, communication, positive discipline, online safety, health, and child protection.

As part of the programme, parents visited the Liri Factory in Prizren, where they had the opportunity to observe the production process firsthand and gain insight into the company's operations. The visit also included discussions with factory representatives about employment opportunities, helping participants better understand the skills and requirements needed to enter the labour market while encouraging greater economic independence for families.



WOMEN SUPPORT GROUP

Throughout 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo continued to implement Women Support Groups in both the Tranzit and Ali Ibra Centres, creating safe and inclusive spaces where women could come together, share experiences, and support one another. Through facilitated discussions and interactive activities, participants explored topics related to emotional well-being, self-confidence, family relationships, health, and social inclusion. The groups also provided opportunities for women to strengthen practical life skills and increase their awareness of available opportunities within their communities. By encouraging participation, peer support, and personal development, the initiative contributed to empowering women and strengthening their role within their families and society.

BREAST CANCER AWARENESS MONTH

As part of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, CONCORDIA Kosovo organised an awareness workshop at the CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre, bringing together 38 women from the CONCORDIA Ali Ibra and Tranzit Centres, as well as women from the surrounding community. The session aimed to strengthen participants' knowledge about breast cancer prevention, encourage early detection, and promote regular health check-ups.

The workshop was led by Dr Qerime Totaj, Family Medicine Specialist, Nehari Shporta, Professional and Family Medicine Nurse, and Valbona Belallari, Psychologist. Participants learned about the most common symptoms, risk factors, methods of examination, and the importance of mammography screening every two years for early diagnosis.

The workshop provided a safe space for women to ask questions, discuss concerns, and receive reliable information directly from healthcare professionals. One of the most emotional moments of the event was the testimony of a breast cancer survivor, who openly shared her personal and psychological journey through diagnosis, treatment, and recovery. Her story encouraged participants to seek preventive care without fear and reinforced the message that early detection saves lives.

The event concluded with a small reception and symbolic gifts, generously supported by Korporata Rugove, creating a warm atmosphere of solidarity and reminding participants that raising awareness and supporting one another are essential in the fight against breast cancer.



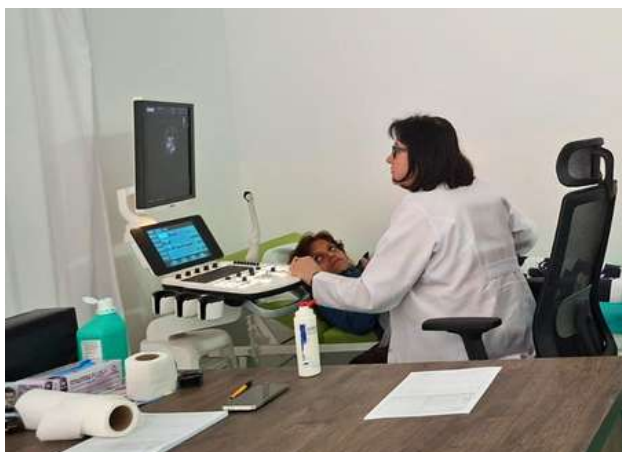
SUPPORTING NEW MOTHERS

In 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo strengthened its commitment to maternal and child wellbeing by launching dedicated support activities for pregnant and postpartum women. The programme combined home visits, centre-based consultations, educational sessions, specialist referrals, and practical assistance to ensure mothers received the care and guidance they needed during pregnancy and the first months of parenthood.

Throughout the year, our team carried out numerous home visits, providing personalised support directly to families, while also organising individual consultations and group sessions at the centre on topics such as maternal health, newborn care, nutrition, breastfeeding, and early childhood development. Mothers were further supported through specialist medical referrals, including gynaecological, neonatal, and microbiological examinations whenever needed.

Recognising that many families face financial hardship after the birth of a child, CONCORDIA Kosovo distributed 15 newborn care packages containing essential items for babies. These packages reached mothers across the community, ensuring that every newborn had a healthier and safer start in life. In addition, families received seasonal assistance through New Year gift packages, clothing donations, hygiene items, and support in accessing essential medicines.

By combining professional guidance with practical assistance, the programme helped reduce barriers to healthcare, strengthened parents' confidence in caring for their newborns, and promoted healthier beginnings for both mothers and children. Through this holistic approach, CONCORDIA Kosovo continues to invest in stronger families and brighter futures from the very first days of life.



BACK TO SCHOOL CAMPAIGN

As the new school year approached, CONCORDIA Kosovo launched the “Shkollimi Ynë Fillon me Ty!” (Our School Year Starts with You!) from 25 to 31 August 2025, with the goal of ensuring that children from vulnerable families could begin the academic year equipped with the materials they need to succeed.

The campaign was implemented in partnership with GIFi Shop at Galeria Shopping Mall, where donation baskets were placed at the store to encourage customers to support children by donating school supplies. To maximize outreach and public engagement, CONCORDIA designed and distributed promotional leaflets, published awareness-raising content across its social media channels, and actively promoted the campaign throughout the week.



The initiative also gained visibility through local media, including an interview on RTK, where the importance of educational support and community solidarity was highlighted. The response from the public was overwhelmingly positive. Individuals, families, and supporters contributed a wide range of educational materials, including school bags, notebooks, books, pencils, and other essential supplies.

By the end of the campaign, donations exceeded €1,000 in value, reflecting the generosity and commitment of the community to supporting children's education. In addition to public contributions, GIFi Shop donated school materials worth €453.92, further strengthening the impact of the campaign and demonstrating the important role that private sector partnerships can play in supporting social initiatives.



SECRET SANTA CAMPAIGN

During the holiday season, CONCORDIA Kosovo organized the Secret Santa Campaign 2025, bringing together local businesses and community partners to create special moments for children participating in our programmes. The campaign encouraged employees from different companies to become “Secret Santas” by selecting a child and fulfilling their holiday wish through a personalized gift.

The initiative aimed not only to provide gifts but also to strengthen the connection between the community and children from vulnerable backgrounds, reminding them that they are valued, supported, and remembered during the festive season. Through the generosity of participating businesses and partners, hundreds of children experienced the joy and excitement of receiving gifts tailored to their wishes.



The campaign was supported by several partners. Gjirafa contributed donations worth €500, while Area Park organized and provided Secret Santa gifts for children participating in Art Therapy activities. Galeria Shopping Mall donated gifts for children enrolled in the Kindergarten Programme, and Gjakova Grill provided gifts for all children attending the Ali Ibra Centre. An especially heartwarming contribution came from the children of Kindergarten “Xixëllonjat”, who prepared and donated various gifts for the children of the Tranzit Centre.

The success of the Secret Santa Campaign demonstrated the power of solidarity and community engagement. By bringing together businesses, employees, and supporters around a common cause, the initiative helped create unforgettable holiday memories and ensured that many children ended the year with smiles, excitement, and a sense of belonging.



A NEW PLAYGROUND

ENDLESS OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHILDREN AT CONCORDIA ALI IBRA CENTRE



Equally important, they create an environment where children can build friendships, strengthen their social skills, learn teamwork, and develop self-confidence through play. Many of the children supported by CONCORDIA come from vulnerable backgrounds and often have limited access to safe recreational spaces. The new playground offers them a place where they can experience joy, creativity, and a sense of belonging. Every play structure encourages exploration, imagination, and positive social interaction—key elements in a child’s emotional and cognitive development.

The opening of the playground was made even more special with the presence of Liri Shpk, who joined the celebration and brought joy to the children by distributing a variety of gifts.

On 22 August 2025, the children of the CONCORDIA Ali Ibra Centre received a gift that will continue to enrich their lives for years to come: a brand-new playground, made possible through the generous support of the Marie Eberth Foundation, from Germany. What was once a simple courtyard has been transformed into a vibrant and welcoming space where children can play, learn, socialise, and simply enjoy being children. The opening of the playground marked more than the completion of an infrastructure project—it represented an investment in childhood, well-being, and healthy development.

For the children attending the centre, access to safe and stimulating outdoor play is essential. Playgrounds provide opportunities for physical activity, helping children develop motor skills, coordination, and overall health.



A NEW STUDIO

CONCORDIA TRANZIT OPENS RECORDING STUDIO AND REHEARSAL HALL WITH THE SUPPORT OF TRION SH.P.K.

A significant milestone was achieved at the CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre in Prizren with the creation of a new semi-professional recording studio and rehearsal hall, made possible through the generous sponsorship of Trion Sh.p.k.

With an investment of €10,000, the project transformed an existing space into a modern and functional environment where children and young people can explore their creativity, develop musical skills, and participate in cultural and artistic activities. The newly established studio has been equipped with professional audio and multimedia equipment, including recording interfaces, studio microphones, monitoring systems, acoustic panels, lighting equipment, and musical technology that meets the needs of young musicians and performers.



More than just a physical space, the studio represents an investment in the potential of children and youth. It provides a unique opportunity for participants in CONCORDIA's music programme to learn instruments, rehearse with orchestras and choirs, record their performances, and gain hands-on experience with modern music production tools. For many young people, this is their first opportunity to engage with professional-quality equipment and discover new pathways for personal and artistic development. The new facility also serves as a venue for cultural events, workshops, performances, and community activities, strengthening the connection between young people and the wider community. By creating a welcoming and inspiring environment, the project encourages participation, boosts motivation, and helps children build confidence through artistic expression.

BRIDGING BORDERS PROJECT

STRENGTHENING DIASPORA ENGAGEMENT FOR A GREATER IMPACT

In 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo started a project dedicated to build the connections with diaspora in Switzerland and the children, youth, and families supported through its programmes. Through the Bridging Borders project, a project funded by Green Light Fund of CONCORDIA International, the organization has worked to create opportunities for diaspora members to contribute to social development in Kosovo through fundraising, knowledge sharing, volunteering, and cultural exchange. During the first year of implementation, the project focused on laying a strong foundation for long-term diaspora engagement. Communication campaigns targeting Albanian-speaking communities in Switzerland were launched through social media, radio broadcasts, and newsletters, helping to increase awareness about CONCORDIA's work and mission. Sponsored social media campaigns reached tens of thousands of people, generating significant engagement and interest from diaspora audiences.

Partnerships with diaspora organizations such as GERMIN and media outlets including AlbRadio played an important role in expanding outreach efforts.

Through newsletters distributed to approximately 2,000 diaspora contacts and dedicated radio programmes, the project successfully introduced new audiences to the impact of CONCORDIA's work in Kosovo.

An equally important achievement was the investment in internal capacity building. Staff members participated in specialized training sessions focused on storytelling, communication strategies, fundraising, and diaspora engagement.

These workshops strengthened the organization's ability to build sustainable relationships with supporters living abroad and to communicate its impact more effectively.



BRIDGING BORDERS PROJECT

A key milestone was the first diaspora engagement event organized in Switzerland. The gathering provided an opportunity to present CONCORDIA's programmes, connect directly with diaspora professionals and supporters, and explore future opportunities for collaboration. The event generated valuable insights and laid the groundwork for stronger diaspora involvement in the future. Building on the lessons learned and relationships established in 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo plans to further expand the Bridging Borders initiative in 2026. In addition to continuing and strengthening activities in Switzerland, the project will extend its outreach efforts to Germany, home to one of the largest Kosovar diaspora communities in Europe.

We were honoured to welcome Ms. Makfire Azemi, Second Secretary and Deputy Consul of the Consulate of the Republic of Kosovo in Zurich, to our fundraising event in Zurich.

By connecting people across borders and encouraging active participation in social change, Bridging Borders Project demonstrates the important role that diaspora communities can play in creating lasting positive impact. As the project enters its next phase, CONCORDIA looks forward to strengthening existing partnerships in Switzerland while opening new doors for collaboration and engagement in Germany.

POLICY REPORT

A PROVEN COMMUNITY-BASED MODEL FOR STRENGTHENING CHILD PROTECTION SYSTEMS ACROSS EUROPE

CONCORDIA Social Projects proudly announces the launch of its new Policy Report, “The CONCORDIA Day Centre Model: Effectively Combating Intergenerational Child Poverty,” presenting a comprehensive and evidence-based approach to strengthening child protection systems through prevention, family support, and community empowerment.

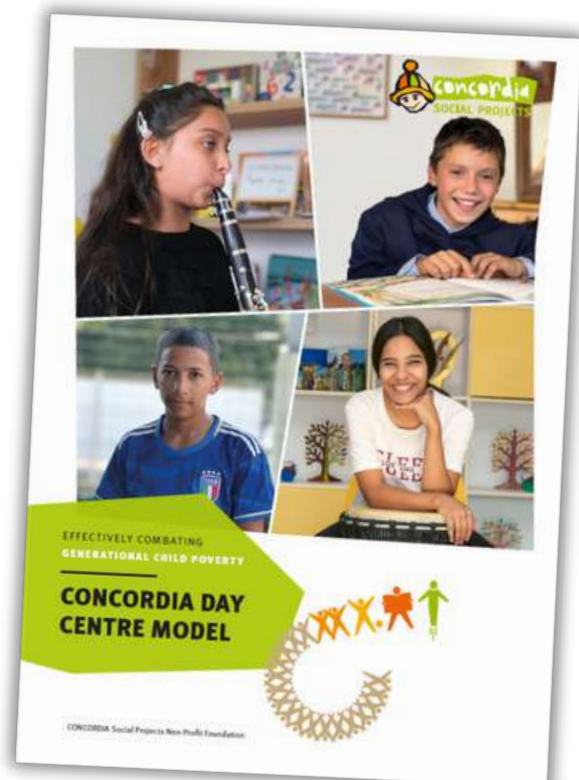
The report highlights the urgent need for sustainable solutions to address intergenerational child poverty – a cycle in which social exclusion, limited access to education, inadequate healthcare, and economic hardship are passed from one generation to the next. Across Europe, millions of children continue to grow up at risk of poverty and exclusion, facing barriers that compromise their rights, well-being, and future opportunities.

Drawing on more than three decades of experience, CONCORDIA presents its Day Centre Model as a practical and scalable solution that places children and families at the centre of intervention. Currently implemented in 20 centres across five countries – Romania, Moldova, Bulgaria, Kosovo, and Austria – with additional centres under development, the model combines educational support, psychosocial services, parental engagement, outreach work, and community partnerships into one integrated framework.

The report demonstrates how preventive, family-centred services can significantly reduce the risk of child neglect, school dropout, family separation, and social exclusion. By supporting children within their families and communities, the model contributes to stronger child protection systems while promoting children's rights, participation, and development.

One of the report's key findings is that child protection cannot rely solely on crisis response. Instead, it requires early intervention, coordinated support services, and active collaboration between local authorities, schools, social workers, healthcare providers, and civil society organisations. The CONCORDIA Day Centre Model offers exactly such an approach by combining multidisciplinary expertise with strong local ownership.

The report also presents measurable results from independent assessments and country-level experiences. Evidence shows improvements in children's well-being, educational performance, family resilience, and social inclusion. In several countries, children participating in CONCORDIA programmes have demonstrated higher school attendance, improved academic results, increased self-confidence, and stronger engagement in community life.



ACTIVITY BOOK TRANZIT

On 2 April, CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre, in cooperation with the **Kosovo Police**, organised an educational session on road safety and online safety for children. Through interactive discussions and practical advice, children learned how to stay safe in traffic and protect themselves from online risks. The activity strengthened their awareness and promoted safe and responsible behaviour both offline and online.



On 2 July 2025, with the support of **GIZ Kosovo**, CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre organised an awareness session on **child and early marriage** for women participating in the Women's Support Group, Parents' School, and Vocational Counselling programme. The session explored the impact of early marriage on children, families, and communities, while addressing psychosocial support, legal assistance, and prevention mechanisms.

On 12 December 2025, as part of the **16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence** campaign, CONCORDIA Tranzit Centre organised an awareness session with a women's group, providing a safe space for reflection, discussion, and mutual support. As a symbol of solidarity, participants lit candles and formed the message "**STOP VIOLENCE**", raising awareness about gender-based violence and promoting dignity, equality, and respect.



ACTIVITY BOOK ALI IBRA

On 24 April, to mark the **International Book Day**, CONCORDIA Ali Ibra Centre, in cooperation with the **Red Cross** and **Kadri Kusari Secondary School**, organised a community activity promoting reading, solidarity, and inclusion.

The reading corner was enriched with new books, while clothing donations were distributed to families in need. Through games, music, and shared activities, volunteers and students helped create a joyful and meaningful day for the children.



On 10 July, CONCORDIA Ali Ibra Centre, in cooperation with and supported by the OSCE, organised the activity "Art That Speaks", bringing together 90 children for a day of creativity and self-expression.

Through painting and drawing, the children shared their thoughts, emotions, and imagination in a safe and encouraging environment. The activity promoted creativity, confidence, and inclusion, while giving every child the opportunity to express themselves through art in an atmosphere filled with joy.

On 3 December, to mark the International Day of Persons with Disabilities, children at CONCORDIA Ali Ibra Centre participated in a creative awareness activity celebrating inclusion, equality, and respect for diversity. Together, the children designed and crafted a symbolic wheelchair, using art as a way to express empathy, solidarity, and the importance of creating a society where everyone has equal opportunities. The activity encouraged discussion about acceptance, accessibility, and the value of recognising each person's unique abilities while promoting kindness and mutual respect among peers.

PRESS TRIP 25'

From 3 to 6 November 2025, CONCORDIA Kosovo organized an international Press Trip, welcoming representatives of leading Austrian media outlets and CONCORDIA Social Projects to Kosovo. The visit provided an opportunity to present the organization's work, meet officials, program participants, and highlight the impact of community-based programmes in Prizren and Gjakova.

The delegation included journalists from Die Presse, Kurier, Kleine Zeitung, Tiroler Tageszeitung, Radio Klassik Stephansdom, and European Voices.

During the four-day visit, participants met with key stakeholders and institutional representatives, including Mr. Shaqir Totaj, Mayor of Prizren Municipality, and Mr. Ardian Gjini, Mayor of Gjakova Municipality, discussing cooperation in supporting vulnerable children, youth, and families. The delegation also held meetings with representatives from OSCE, principal of Mustafa Bakija School in Gjakova, ms. Zana Kurtishi Rudi and principal of Ibrahim Fehmiu School in Prizren, mr. Shqiptar Thaqi, and other partners involved in child protection and social inclusion initiatives.



The programme included visits to the CONCORDIA Transit Centre in Prizren and the Ali Ibra Centre in Gjakova, where guests met staff members, children, and young people participating in the programmes. Journalists had the opportunity to observe educational and psychosocial activities, attend a rehearsal of the children's orchestra and choir, and visit beneficiary families to gain a deeper understanding of the challenges they face and the support provided through CONCORDIA's services.

In addition to the programme visits, participants explored the cities of Prishtina, Prizren, and Gjakova, gaining a broader understanding of the social context in which CONCORDIA Kosovo operates. The Press Trip strengthened relationships with international media partners and increased awareness of the organization's mission to create opportunities for children and families living in vulnerable situations.

FINANCIAL REPORT

In 2025, CONCORDIA Projekte Sociale Kosovo recognised a total income of €675,493, reflecting the continued trust and commitment of institutional donors, public authorities, foundations, private companies, and individual supporters. This strong financial foundation enabled the organisation to expand educational and social services for children, young people, and families in vulnerable situations across Kosovo.

The largest source of funding was the Renovabis TANI Project, contributing €302,436, followed by support from the Marie Eberth Foundation with €94,755. Significant contributions were also received from Conrad Keifl Foundation (€100,002), Jesuiten Weltweit (€48,220), GLF Bridging Borders (€33,544), Vita Activa Foundation (€30,001), the Municipality of Prizren (€25,000), the Ministry of Justice (€17,167), Horváth & Partners (€16,649), Trion Shpk (€10,010), project Digi Youth funded by Land Voralberg, Austria (€9,498), and several other valued partners.
